Summer Fruit Soup

Fruit Soup - easy to make and refreshing to eat - is the perfect summer dessert. This recipe is economical, as it uses in-season produce (not expensive dried fruits). It is healthy, as it contains no fat and can be made without sugar. And it is parve.



Prep Time: 20 minutes, **Cook Time:** 1 hour

Ingredients:

- 3 cups fresh fruit, diced (peaches, nectarines, apricots, plums, grapes)
- 6 cups water
- 1/2 cup sugar or honey, or to taste
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 Tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/4 cup cold water

Preparation:

1. Combine all fruit, water, sugar or honey, and cinnamon in a large pot.
2. Bring to a boil, cover, simmer over low heat for 1 hour.
3. Mix 2 Tablespoons of cornstarch into 1/4 cup cold water. Then stir the cornstarch mixture into the soup.

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Happy Accidents

Sometimes the best discoveries come about due to mistakes. Throughout history, mistakes have contributed many important and useful products to mankind. Here are some examples of the good accidents that have enriched our lives.

Coca-Cola. In 1886 a pharmacist named John Pemberton concocted a medicinal syrup, hoping to create a tonic for people who were tired, nervous, or suffering from bad teeth. He marketed it as a tonic for a year unsuccessfully. It was only after the soda was sold as a soft drink that it took off to become the brand it is today.

Penicillin. In 1929 scientist Alexander Fleming accidentally left one of his bacteria samples near an open window. It was contaminated by mold spores. He examined the sample and noticed that the mold was eliminating the bac-

teria. He concluded that this substance was able to destroy bacteria and eventually began to use it to control infections in humans.

Chocolate Chip Cookies. Around 1930, innkeeper Ruth Wakefield was baking chocolate cookies and discovered that she did not have the cocoa powder called for. Instead, she chopped up a chocolate bar and put the chunks in the batter, expecting them to melt in the oven. Instead, she got butter cookies studded with chocolate "chips."

Post-It Notes. A 3M researcher was trying to develop an improved form of adhesive tape. Instead he got a substance that stayed semi sticky. This concoction was shelved for another four years until another 3M researcher was looking for a way to keep bookmarks from falling out of a book. The two ideas came together to form the Post-It note, first marketed in 1980.

Silly Putty. During World War II, the U.S. government was trying to develop a synthetic rubber. They experimented with silicone and eventually tried adding boric acid to silicone oil. The substance, however, failed as a good rubber substitute—it was too gooey and bouncy. After the war, it was marketed as a toy called Silly Putty.

Pacemaker. The pacemaker sewn into a loved one's chest actually came about because American engineer Wilson Greatbatch reached into a box and pulled out the wrong thing. Greatbatch was working on making a circuit to help record fast heart sounds. He reached into a box for a resistor in order to finish the circuit and pulled out a 1-megaohm resistor instead of a 10,000-ohm one. The circuit pulsed for 1.8 milliseconds and then stopped for one second. Then it repeated. The sound was as old as man: a perfect heartbeat.

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
